Homeless Aging and Disabled Veterans Initiative



As the overall Veteran population gets older, many Veterans facing homelessness are also aging. Because homelessness is hard on the body and mind, these Veterans are more likely to contend with disabilities and chronic health conditions as well.

According to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD)'s 2023 PIT Count, more than 35,000 Veterans were experiencing homelessness in the United States on a single night in January 2023. Since nearly half of all Veterans are 65 and older, according to the U.S. Census Bureau, that adds up to many aging and disabled Veterans who may need assistance from VA.

The HUD-VA Supportive Housing (HUD-VASH) and Geriatrics and Extended Care (GEC) programs have stepped up to ensure that these Veterans have the support they need to secure housing and remain stably housed over time.





About the Initiative

VA's Homeless Aging and Disabled Veterans Initiative finds innovative ways to bring together home and community health care, social services, and permanent supportive housing programs.

It combines resources from the HUD-VASH program, which pairs HUD Housing Choice Vouchers with VA case management and supportive services, and the GEC program, which advances quality care for aging and chronically ill Veterans and seeks to maximize their functional independence.

The initiative aims to:

- Increase access to GEC community care programs
- Develop housing options to assist with using HUD-VASH vouchers in specialized care settings
- Expand the use of HUD-VASH project-based vouchers with intensive services that could be provided where Veterans live
- Proactively develop partnerships with community agencies
